








Confirming the usability of an educational program for midwives wanting to lead practice change in clinical areas.

Aims:

- To evaluate the appeal and suitability of an implementation Toolkit for Australian midwives.
- To determine the effectiveness of the intervention
- 3) To establish the degree to which the intervention could reach a broad cross-section of midwives.



Participant Recruitment & Toolkit Access



Recruitment period: Aug 2022 – Jun 2023

Two recruitment methods:


- Via midwifery managers (identified change leaders)
- Through Australian College of Midwives (email + magazine ad)

ACM endorsement:

- Toolkit hosted on ACM eLearning platform
- Free access + 4 CPD points

Access & Evaluation Process:

- Pre-survey: demographics, confidence, barriers
- Toolkit use tracked via metrics
 Post-evaluation survey embedded in final module



Data collection and analysis



Data Sources:

Data Set 1: Pre-start survey (Qualtrics[™])

Quantitative & qualitative questions

Data Set 2: Evaluation survey (Qualtrics™)

Same structure as pre-start survey

Data Set 3: Toolkit data (Articulate Rise 360)


Participation rates, access frequency

Analysis Methods:

Quantitative: Frequency counts

Qualitative: Content analysis

- Coding → descriptive categories
- Illustrative quotes



Evaluation (Pre-start)



Participant Engagement & Pre-Start Insights

- 49 midwives accessed the course
- 26 midwives completed the course evaluation

Pre-start survey explored:

- Understanding of Implementation Science
- Experience leading practice-change initiatives
- Confidence to implement practice change
- Attributes of effective change leaders





Findings (Pre-start questionnaire)...

"I want to work on improving EBP in rural health services for women"

"I'd like to be involved in Improving practice for Induction of Labour"

"I'd like to introduce waterbirth to our birth suite"

"I want to implement best practice care for women experiencing miscarriage and ectopic pregnancies"

"I want to Introduce a best practice care pathway for breech birth"

What barriers have you experienced?

"People and resources are the biggest challenges"

"Lack of time"

"Our staff have change fatigue"

"Funding is always an issue"

"Other disciplines not supportive of midwifery—led change"

"Training and education are not encouraged in my workplace"




